Lovelandtown

Lovelandtown is located east of Bridge Avenue on the Bay Head side of the Lovelandtown Bridge. It is bordered on the west by the Point Pleasant Canal, on the south by the head of Barnegat Bay, on the east by Bay Head and the northern border is Bridge Avenue. Of note is that the Bay Head Historical Society's Loveland Homestead is in Lovelandtown!



Of the 41 original homes in the 1830's settlement, there are but a handful left. Although it was never incorporated as a municipality, it was recognized on maps in the 1890's.

According to Esther Loveland Kinsley in "Lovelandtown, a small hamlet in Ocean County" by Pauline S. Miller, "Lovelandtown has undergone many changes since 1817 when Charles Stout built the first house in what would become known as Lovelandtown". The family names that first settled this area along with Stout are Curtis, Cook, Johnson, Pearce, Tilton, Van Note and, of course, Loveland.

Being a small hamlet in the 1800's would have meant a self-sufficient village. Everyone contributed to the daily life and certainly looked out for one another. According to the late Bob O'Brien, founder of the N. J. Museum of Boating and Trustee of the Bay Head Historical Society, "the center of boatbuilding started and thrived in Lovelandtown." It was, and is, a maritime-related community that once rejected an offer from Edward Howe and David Mount, two of the principal developers of Bay Head, to join the town to the east. Why Captain John E. Loveland refused to join the newly organized town in 1886 is anybody's guess. They subsequently joined Point Pleasant in 1920. Both communities were a part of Brick Township at that time.

Lovelandtown has more things in common with Bay Head than they have with Point Pleasant. The emergency services, police, fire department, etc., are closer and consequently the residents applied for secession in the late 20th century to no avail.

THE BAY HEAD ELECTRICITY WAR OF 1901

The Point Pleasant trolley and electric company thought it was their right and destiny to enter Bay Head, even though Bay Head residents wanted to preserve the rustic charm of the town as a change from the speedy tempo of the city.

According to the Toms River Courier front page article of June 20, 1901 "CUT ELECTRIC LIGHTS DOWN"

Bay Head residents had a lively sensation on Sunday morning last when it was discovered that electric light wires had been strung through the borough during the night in defiance of the authorities. There was still a livelier sensation when the borough fathers armed with axes destroyed both wires and poles....Last winter the new Grenville Arms Hotel was built and wired throughput for electric lights. The borough refused a request to connect electricity to the hotel.


"Saturday night the lighting company put a force of linemen at work after everybody had gone to sleep. Next morning the astonished burghers found poles planted and wires strung from the hotel to the Delaware and Atlantic phone line...four men, two on the poles and two on the ground, were connecting up the line, Mayor Pennington charged upon the first two,, who, being treed, had to surrender, The two men on the ground escaped Marshall Forsythe by skipping across the borough line. What to do with the prisoners was a question: some suggested the county jail, others a fine. As they were but employees however, the Mayor arraigned his captives as disorderly, reprimanded them, and as they were hungry, bought them a breakfast and sent them off.

But the wires and the poles did not escape so easily. In solid phalanx with sharp axes and dull, headed by Mayor Pennington, Councilmen Parker, Pearce, Johnson, Will Marshall Forsythe, Road Commissioner Lige Chadwick and others made deadly onset. The poles were hacked down and wires cut where they crossed the streets. The telephone company managers (sic) were also notified that if they allowed their poles to be used for light wires their franchise would be revoked and poles cut down. They hastily explained that the use of their poles was a mistake."
