A HISTORY OF THE BAY HEAD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

When Bay Head was incorporated in 1886, it was basically a summer resort for affluent families from the Philadelphia and Princeton areas. Their Shingle Style, Stick Style and Queen Anne style "summer cottages" are still the reason for the charm and character of Bay Head.

In 1990 there was a surge in new construction in our area, which alerted our founding mothers, Evalyn Shippee, Allison Goetting, and the Nancy Petracco, to the risk of a change of character to the community. Very few people at that time seemed to be aware of the history and/or architecture that makes Bay Head so special.

The first effort was to acquire the old railroad buildings in the center of town to restore and showcase the town's history. When that effort failed, they enlisted others to help and two years later, in 1993, the Bay Head Historical Society incorporated as a 501c (non-profit) organization.

In 1995 an architectural history firm was commissioned to survey every structure in town to give us a report as to our architectural significance. They reported that 2/3 of the town qualified for both the State and National Registries of Historic Places. The Town Council at that time declined to apply for the designations.

Following a second survey several years later, with Council support, the town was accepted for placement on both the State and National Registry of Historic Places in 2002, and a Historic District was created. The inclusion of Bay Head into the State and National Registries of Historic Places gives the Bay Head Historical Society (and the Borough itself) some clout with state and/or federal agencies who want to come in to change something (for example widening the streets). It is, by New Jersey law, necessary for them to check with us first.



In 1995 the search for an appropriate location for a museum began, and the current building was purchased in 1998. Total renovation was completed in 2000 and the Museum, known as the Loveland Homestead, was opened. The museum is located just over the town line of Bay Head, in the Lovelandtown section of Point Pleasant. The building was originally constructed in 1867, with a substantial addition in 1887. This location is highly appropriate because of the entwined history of Lovelandtown and Bay Head.

Originally, the museum was furnished as a Victorian style farmhouse and featured the William Schoettle collection of photographs. While the Schoettle collection remains the backbone of our collection, we have transformed the museum into a gallery space with a permanent Bay Head display, and two rooms for seasonally

changing shows featuring Head of the Bay history. The Museum is open from early June through December. Hours are available on our website.

In the past we have held house tours of historic Bay Head and Mantoloking homes. Our last house tour was just two weeks before Super Storm Sandy, which then proceeded to damage and/or destroy every home on the tour. Future house tours are being considered.

From its inception, the organization has recognized the importance of maintaining our historic heritage through our annual Preservation/Restoration Awards to buildings in Mantoloking and Bay Head.

In addition, we publish 2 newsletters a year and hold a general membership meeting in June, with a featured speaker. Our 600+ members are invited to a yearly holiday party and have free admission to the museum.

The museum continues to be a place for education, awareness, and enjoyment, while also serving as a social center for the entire community.

Membership is open to everyone; everyone from anywhere is welcome. We suggest a donation from non-members.



BOARD OF TRUSTEES CONSIDERS ADDITIONAL REPAIRS

The Loveland Homestead building is in very good shape following last winter major preservation work. With the help of Architect Jeff Schneider, Spencer Builders and Tim Crimmins, masonry craftsman, the job was completed at an affordable price. The west end of the building was elevated with helical piles and new piers; the chimney was totally rebuilt and the cracked walls and window were replaced.

Now the Board of Trustees is considering additional preservation and updates. The electrical system is our highest priority as there are some areas with no outlets or the existing wiring may be unsafe. The walls and ceiling on the second floor are long-standing issues which need to be addressed as well as the porch railings. The Museum grounds are also on our list. The garden will be completely redone as well as the dune grass planting on the south side of the Dale Building, and the flagpole area. We will be reaching out to local resources for guidance in securing native and sustainable planting for these areas. Lastly we plan to purchase a much-needed bike rack which will add to the safety of our parking lot. If you would like to be involved in this effort, please contact Cathie Coleman@netscape.net
