Gatsby'd Feel Right at Home in This Jersey Shore Resort

BAY HEAD, NJ_...at the Bay Head Yacht Club you might expect to see a couple of Princeton boys roar up in a Stutz Bearcat and begin a quick game of handball. The entire village of Bay Head on New Jersey's Barnegat Bay, simply reeks of another era, another time.

I couldn't help but think here was a fading part of America's past, a small sleepy American town that had not changed appreciably in 50 years. It's not hard to grow nostalgic in a place like Bay Head, for the residents here choose to preserve the past; outsiders and change are strongly resisted. Bay Head is an insular world. One gets the feeling that he either belongs or he doesn't. In Bay Head there is no in between.

The bar at the Bluffs Hotel...unheralded by signs ...features a potbellied stove and dart board and continues to thrive. Part of its success, I suppose, is its "clubiness". Here, where everyone seems to know everyone else, a certain ambience reminiscent of an earlier era exists.

Like I said, there are no signs to direct you to the Bluffs bar. And if you have to ask you don't belong. But you might try looking for a Stutz Bearcat parked outside.

Built in an era when the rich traveled with a retinue of servants, a house of 15-20 rooms is not uncommon here. And the similarity of the architecture indicates a turn-of-the-century building boom where porches the size of a large New York City duplex were common and ornamental Victorian turrets were not unheard of. The very notion of heating such massive structures is beyond the imagination; a maharajah could go to Europe for that amount of money. Judging from the pre-season boarded-up windows one conjectures that many owners do.

Over at the local movie house, the Lorraine, things haven't changed much either. An aging white clapboard structure with green lettering, the Lorraine was around when Charlie Chaplin first started making movies. Nowadays it's closed most of the time. But in comparison to many theaters that pass for old today, the Lorraine makes most of them seem like the Trans-Lux East.
